As a member of Amnesty International, I am very concerned about the violation of anyone's human rights. 1992 is being marked in many countries as the 500th anniversary of Europeans' arrival in America, as an appropriate time to highlight concerns about human rights against indigenous peoples.

In your country I an concerned about the case of <u>Helson</u> <u>Aladiairo Curinir Lincoqueo</u> who 'disappeared' in 1973. His body was later found, and proved that he had been shot. I am very concerned about all extrajudicial killings, and in his case I am pleased to read that there was an investigation into his death. I hope that the full truth will emerge, and that those responsible will be brought to justice.

I must connent that Annesty International believes that the amnesty law of 1978 is an obstacle to clarifying past abuses and preventing their recurrence, and therefore believes that the law should be repealed.

I assure you that by concern is not at all political, but is purely humanitarian.
